DISCIPLES CONNECT AND EQUIP: ADAPTIVE CHANGE IN A CHANGED WORLD



The Regional Disciples Connect & Equip event is scheduled for Saturday, August 6, at the Disciples Center at Tawakoni. This year's theme is "Adaptive change in a changed world" and what it means for Disciples.

Registration opens Friday, May 13. Registration deadline is Friday, July 22

With the focus on "equipping," we hope to provide more opportunities for congregational leaders to learn adaptive change methods in this post-pandemic/endemic

world. Workshops will be a combination of knowledge, instruction and teaching practical skills. Topics under consideration, but not finalized, include:

- Adaptive Change/Developing an Adaptive Change Culture
- Anti-Racism/Pro-Reconciliation
- Refugees: How can we help?
- Exploring New Church Ministry
- Week of Compassion's Disaster Preparedness Team Training
- Church Communications Team
- Churches Supporting Children of Trauma

2022 marks a Regional Assembly year where we conduct the business of the Regional Church. According to the Constitution and Bylaws of the Christian Church in Kansas, any major resolution to be considered by the 2022 Regional Assembly must be on the desk of the Regional Minister and President, by May 9, which is 90-days before the Assembly. The Committee will consider the resolutions and prepare them for the Assembly. Resolutions will be sent to the congregations on June 9.

Resolutions may be presented by any member congregation or administrative unit, the Regional Board, any ten individual members, or any organization of the Christian Church in Kansas (Disciples of Christ). All resolutions should be accompanied by a written statement of the reasons that the submitting group deems it necessary or advisable for the Assembly to consider the subject. Any supporting data or rationale that will assist in understanding the full impact of the resolution should also be included.

Each church is also asked to provide the names of voting delegates the have elected to represent their church at this assembly. The number of voting delegates is based on the church's reported membership. Each office will receive instructions and a Voting Delegates Form to fill out and return to the Topeka Regional Office no later that July 15.

Following lunch, we'll feature a keynote speaker (to be determined), and hopefully introduce a new Co-Regional Minister. Watch the *Kansas Messenger* and Facebook for future details on this event.

Cost for the event will be \$15 for adults, \$10 for youth and children (5-18 years), with children under five at no charge. The fee covers program, lunch, and child care. Child care will be available for pre-registered children 4-years old and younger. Pre-register online at www.kansasdisciples.org, or through ENGAGE on or after May 13.

I remembered as a young teenager watching another tornado meander through mostly open fields near my childhood home. Tornadoes are power on display, reminding us of the transitory nature of life itself.


As I watched this one, I was grateful that the camp was spared, but sorrowful that others were losing their homes and businesses in and around Andover.

Hord Owens. Ken notified




Reminded yet again that we are all connected, I am grateful for the churches and people of Kansas.

ENGAGE GIVING

The ENGAGE online giving system is an easy to use, mobile optimized system that you can use through web link, app or now by text. Using the text method, you can target your giving to the CCK fund of your choice.

Once enrolled in ENGAGE, text: **FUND NAME** <dollar amount> to **785-278-0678**. For example: **ANNUALFUND 100** will make a \$100 donation to the Annual Fund.

The last message received should be a final confirmation. Example: "Success! Thank you for your gift of \$100. You will receive an email confirming the gift to **<your email address>.**

With your Engage account you can also update phone and email, register for events and create recurring gifts or one-time gifts all from one login.



EQUIPPING SMALL CHURCHES TO CONNECT WITH 21ST CENTURY FOLLOWERS

Church Copyright Guidelines and Security Protocols: How to protect your church in a digital world

Editor's note: This article is part three of three that offers church communication strategies specifically for small congregations. While the focus is on small churches, all churches will find the strategies presented helpful for their ministry.

With the digital world expanding and overlapping with church ministry, churches need to be more careful than ever before about copyright infringement. Churches are not immune to copyright infringement and a non-profit status or using materials for "educational purposes" is no longer adequate protection.

When at all possible, create and use your own materials – text, graphics, photographs – and give credit to the source of your content. When using someone else's published content, check for fair use, cite your source, and when in doubt, contact the copyright holder to get written permission to republish their work.

Not all Google search images are classified as free public domain images. Be sure to set your search filters to "Free," "Public Domain," or "Creative Commons" before using as PowerPoint backdrops, article graphics, or cover art.

Given the world we live in, and given that churches should be a sanctuary for all, churches need written policies about publishing photographs on your church website and social media pages. Every church should get a signed photo release form from members before publishing photos.

This is *a must* for children and is highly encouraged for adults too. We don't know what a person's home or family life is like and there may be a reason their photo should not be published publicly.

Live streaming has revolutionized worship. When live streaming, be sure to purchase the CCLI License for live streaming and pay attention to the reporting process for songs covered under this licensing agreement.

When it comes to your digital content and the software programs you use, be sure to use strong, secure passwords and then log-in from password protected WiFi networks. Your church office should maintain a master list of all log-in information in a secure location as back-up. These passwords should be changed regularly especially with changeover in staff and/or church leadership.

Each program should also have a minimum of three admins from different families assigned (maximum of six people). This provides an internal counterbalance so that content reflects the views and beliefs of the church as a whole and not one individual. It also ensures that you will not lose access to your accounts when someone moves,

dies, or otherwise leaves the church.

Just as important as the software you use is your hardware (ie. computer, camera, microphone.) Keep a master inventory list of all assets with date of purchase, cost/value, serial/model numbers. If permanently installed, note where it is located. If mobile, record where it is stored when not in use, and if it is checked-out to specific staff members, who has it. In some cases, a picture of the item in question may be appropriate.

For items that are mobile or not permanently installed, consider a highend, lockable fireproof, waterproof, shockproof storage case to protect your investment. You may even consider storing these storage cases in a locked closet or cabinet and limiting who has the key to that storage room or cabinet for added security.

When it comes to hardware remember that most technology has a three-to-five-year life span. Your church should plan for this by setting aside funds needed to upgrade and/or replace hardware regularly in addition to keeping your software application(s) up to date.

CAMP NEWS

TAWAKONI WELCOMES SEE AS NEW CAMP MANAGER

In December, Sid Rutland, our Camp Manager, submitted a letter of resignation. In February, a search committee, of over a dozen people, was formed to do an exit interview, revise the job description and design a search process. Then, a smaller group consisting of Mark Watkins, Bob Gleason, Belinda Amend, Loy Hoskins, Laurie Lewis, Larry Ross, and Ken Marston worked to advertise the position, interview the candidates, and make an offer to the best qualified.

We received about 40 applications. Initial examination narrowed the pool to 10. Then, after some thought and prayer, the team settled on four candidates. These remaining candidates had post graduate education, and significant experience in the three main areas we were assessing:

1) their knowledge and ability to maintain and repair facilities and equipment, 2) an understanding and vision for the type of essential regional programing and events, 3) knowledge and vision for how to promote use of the camp so that the camp becomes self-sustaining.

Among the four that remained: two had degrees from Texas Christian University and the other two from other institutions of higher learning; two were male, two were female. One had significant experience and skills and marketing but was not as strong in maintenance or programing use of facilities. One had significant experience as a camp manager, but there was at least a 10-year gap between that experience and the present. Another also had extensive knowledge and experience in the maintenance of buildings, and some knowledge about marketing and programing, but had changed jobs every year or two for the past 20 years.

The fourth candidate was Rev. Olivia See. While the other candidates had strengths in one of the three assessed areas, Olivia was the most balanced of the candidates and brings to the work of camp manger the perspective ministry we felt would enhance the work of the region for the future.

Olivia will work with Sid through out this summer's camp season. Sid's final day is July 31. The interview team is excited about how Olivia will help us adapt to the new reality of camp ministry and regional life.

ARE YOU NEEDING TO UPGRADE YOUR CHURCH TECH?

Disciples Church Extension Fund (DCEF) is offering loans of up to US \$50,000 for technology upgrades to help qualified congregations pivot to a stronger online presence. RECONCILIATION GRANT COMMITTEE AWARDS FOUR MINISTRY GRANTS

Four Kansas anti-racism/pro-reciliation ministries will receive grants from the Reconciliation Special Offering received this Fall. Half of the funds received for this offering go to the general church while the other half stays in Kansas to fund ministry projects like these. The 2022 recipients are:

Pine Valley Church in Wichita who provides birthday backpacks to at-risk children in the Oaklawn, Cooper and Jefferson Elementary Schools. These children are from the poorest families in their community. They have requested \$3,000.

"Peace Camp" sponsored by West Side Christian Church in Topeka serves elementary age children on July 11-15 with a focus on understanding, celebrating, and living with diversity. They have requested \$2,318.

The third request comes from **Home Sweet Home, a homeless ministry in Independence**. They are providing housing, counseling, budgeting, and job placement services. This effort involves FCC Independence as well as four other churches in Independence. They have requested \$3,000.

North Heights Christian Church, in Wichita, seeks funding for their "Books for Prisoners" program. This helps provide resources to prisoners who are suffering from mental health issues and provides hope during their time of incarceration. Their program will provide carefully curated self-help books for inmates of the Butler and Sedgwick County jails. Especially for inmates in support groups, to help prepare inmates for a better life once out of jail. They have requested \$1,000.

The committee has agreed to support these ministries, but it will take a combined effort of our whole church coming together to make this happen. It's believed that with prayer and focus these ministries can be more fully realized.
