JOIN US FOR THE 2022 DISCIPLES CONNECT & EQUIP REGIONAL ASSEMBLY

The Regional Disciples Connect & Equip event is scheduled for Saturday, August 6, at the Disciples Center at Tawakoni. This year's theme will center around "Adaptive change in a changed world" and what it means for Disciples.

Early Bird Registration deadline is Monday, July 25.

2022 marks a regional assembly year, and the bi-annual (every two years) business session to vote on the following items, and any others

brought to the assembly:

- Election of new regional officers/moderators
- Approve revisions to the CCK constitution
- Approve the calling of a new Co-Regional Minister

Note: Copies of the business items were e-mailed in early July, copies will be available at the event.

Additionally, there will be multiple workshop opportunities and a chance to meet and visit with our new Co-Regional Minister, Rev. Tom Stanley. With the focus on "equipping," we hope to provide more opportunities for congregational leaders to learn adaptive change methods in this post-pandemic/endemic world. Workshops will be a combination of knowledge instruction and teaching practical skills.

- Anti-Racism/Pro-Reconciliation
- Refugee Resettlement: How can we help?
- The Covenant Project: Changes to Disciples Governance
- The Tri-Regional Partnership: What is it?
- Church Communications Team

- Little Things Are Big Things: Being a Relevant Church

Kansas Disciples Men's ministry is providing boxed lunches. Ham, turkey, or veggie sandwich options are available with chips, cookie, and choice of drink. Pre-registration is needed by July 25 to guarantee a meal choice preference.

Following lunch, we'll have another workshop session, open pool for swimming, and introduce our new Co-Regional Minister, Rev. Tom Stanley. We'll close out the event with worship and the installation of officers.

Child care will be available for pre-registered children 4-years old and younger. Elementary aged children and middle school youth activates are currently being planned for the morning with swimming in the afternoon. High School youth are encouraged to attend and participate in the workshop discussions and fellowship activities.

Cost is \$15 for adults, \$10 for youth and children (5-18 years), with children under five years at no charge and covers program, lunch, and child care. 
Ken tells me that I ask good questions, so I want to leave you with a few. If the role of the Region is to 'Connect and

The next Disciple Men's Retreat will be Sept. 16-17, start making plans to attend. Our guest speaker will be Rev. Dr. Paul Koch, Regional Minister for the Christian Church in Mid-America.

Paul values most being a pastor to pastors and a shepherd for people seeking wider church connections in their faith. He is especially overjoyed that this includes helping men and his



brothers among congregations grow into a deeper, vital, transformative spirituality through Disciples Men.

As a local pastor, he has always created weekly community men's groups that had stable followings. Each took various approaches to content and when guides were scarce, he wrote his own curricula on dozens of topics and approaches.

WEEK OF COMPASSION SERVING IN UKRAINE



It's been just more than four months since Russian troops invaded Ukraine, and the destruction, casualties, and horror have not ceased. The Ukrainian people have gathered in force, receiving military aid, and holding out far longer than most global experts

anticipated. Meanwhile, the humanitarian crisis has grown, overflowing Ukraine's borders into the surrounding nations that are welcoming and tending to millions of refugees, even as millions more internally displaced persons remain in country. The repercussions will be felt for years, and while relief supplies and aid have been immediate, the ripple effects and response will be long-lasting.

Week of Compassion and ecumenical partners focused emergent aid on the immediate needs of refugees, providing shelter, food, medical and psychosocial care, education, and vocational resources. Over the next months and years, that assistance will continue as some evacuees choose to return home when they are able, and others resettle more permanently into new locations and lives.

In just four months, Week of Compassion has received gifts totaling \$1.7 million. Working alongside global partners, Disciples are serving with:

- ACT Alliance Ukraine, Hungary, Romania, Poland, Slovakia; transition centers at borders, housing, food packets, social services
- <u>Baptist World Alliance</u>- Ukraine, Poland; churches as safe havens and sanctuaries, emergency shelters and transitional centers into stable accommodation
- <u>Global Ministries</u>- Greece apartments, utilities for refugee families; Hungary - support for churches caring for internally displaced persons
- International Orthodox Christian Charities Poland, Romania, Ukraine - food, water, clothing, shelter to IDPs; special focus on women & children, safety from gender based violence
- <u>L'Arche</u> online connections for separated families, medicine and hygiene supplies, adaptation and disability support needs

THE COVENANT PROJECT

HOW WE DO CHURCH IN A DIFFERENT TIME AND PLACE

The future of the church is more connected. The future of the church is in deeper conversation. The future of the church is a future with deeper covenant. The Covenant Project is the work of changing structures to be more just and relationships across the church to be more connected.



The Covenant Project began more than three years ago as part of the work of Governance Committee of the General Board of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). When the Governance Committee met in retreat in the Fall of 2019, they committed to the work of aligning the Design of the Christian Church (DOC) with God's design for the church and to claim the power and potential of covenant.

To that end, the committee took two important steps: the first was the development of the Covenant Curriculum, a small group resource for congregations to explore their identity as covenantal partners in the wider church. The second was a process of a review of the Design, with an aim to explore how the church's structures and practices might shift to better serve the church.

When the Christian Church established The Design in 1969, much of the structures and practices were adapted from the existing structures. However, the changing composition of the church and a growing desire to have our structures reflect our commitment to be a movement for wholeness in a fragmented world means rethinking how we engage and relate to one another.

The goal is for each member of the Christian Church to understand the Covenant Project proposed changes and have the ability to provide feedback. We encourage you to attend a Covenant Project town hall.

THE GATHERING: A RETREAT FOR PASTORS

stages of ministry, we invite you to attend *The Gathering: A Retreat for Pastors*. The Gathering is a biennial conference that helps you connect with other pastors as you join together to learn and discuss spiritual, health, and financial wellness. Our hope is that you will leave The Gathering feeling refreshed and inspired.

The conference will open on Tuesday, Sept. 6 with The American Spiritual Ensemble (ASE). ASE is composed of some of the finest performers in the classical music world. ASE consists of more than 125 singers hailing from a wide variety of backgrounds, including; The Metropolitan Opera soloists, Broadway veterans, as well as some of the most prominent voice professors within the United States.

The keynote speaker, Dr. Matt Bloom, Ph. D. is a professor at the Mendoza College of Business at the University of Notre Dame with expertise in working with a variety of not-for-profit

organizations. He leads the *Flourishing in Ministry and Wellbeing at Work* research projects which focus on the wellbeing of helping and caring professions. Matt is passionate about finding real solutions to make work a healthy, vibrant, life-enriching experience as a spouse of a former United Methodist minister. Matt will share the latest research on the wellbeing of clergy and practical insights about how to build and sustain that wellbeing.

Cost is \$100 if your home congregation's average worship attendance is less than 100; \$150 if your home congregation average worship attendance is more than 100; and \$150 for spouses.

Cost includes registration, two breakfasts, one lunch, and a hotel for two nights. Additional discounted room rates are available over Labor Day weekend to come before the beginning of the conference as well as the weekend following the conference.

Arrival transportation to the hotel will not be provided, however, Pension Fund will be arranging shuttles to the airport at the conclusion of the event. If you choose to stay longer, you will be responsible for transportation back to the airport.

To get started, go to www.kansasdisciples.org/give and click the ENGAGE portal button. From there, follow the onscreen instructions to create an account or log into your existing account. If creating a new account, you will receive an email to reset your password and confirm the creation of your account. Mobile users will be prompted to add *engage.suran.com* as a shortcut app. After account creation, you can update your information, manage regional and district giving, and register for events all from one login.
