THOUGHTS FROM YOUR REGIONAL MINISTER

Looking at Our World with Greater Compassion By Ken Marston, Co-Regional Minister

I recently received a phone call from Dale Suggs, one of my college and seminary classmates. Dale is doing some very creative

ministry as the Co-Founder of **BELOVED** Way Church and Founder of **BELOVED** Compassion Network. These organizations center their ministry around bringing healing and wholeness in their community by helping people develop a greater compassion for themselves and others.

With so much anger and hatred being espoused in the world right now my friend Dale believes that compassion is key to addressing the tendency to divide ourselves into divisive factions that are tearing our communities apart.

This work begins with learning how to be more compassionate with ourselves so that we can become more compassionate with others. It is a living out of the Jesus, who

often encountered people who were wrestling with and seeking how to live in the Kingdom of God right then.

Scripture tells us repeatedly that as Jesus would relate to others, he would look upon them with compassion, whether it was the crowds or his antagonists. And out of his compassion, he would invite everyone to consider thinking and acting in new ways that were shaped by the values of God's will for life.

We, too, wrestle with how to do this from day to day, and I think my friend Dale's insight is helpful as we struggle to follow in the footsteps of Jesus. So, I invite you to consider this concept of compassion—an ability to not only put ourselves in another's shoes, but to see ourselves, others, and all of creation as God's beloved.

How might our lives and our communities, our nation and our world be changed if we had an ever-growing compassion towards life?

RECONCILIATION OFFERING FUNDS FOUR KANSAS MINISTRIES

Since the beginning of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) our purpose has been to bring healing and hope to a divided world. The Week of Reconciliation Special Offering which we receive Sept. 25 and Oct. 2 helps fund ministries in Kansas and throughout the United States and Canada that feed the hungry and heal divisions in the lives of people.

This year, we have received funding requests for \$9318 from four Kansas Ministries.


Home Sweet Home serves men, women, families and veterans in housing crisis. They have a variety of programs to help people establish a stable living way of life including life skill training and employment help. A staff chaplain provides spiritual and emotion support in addition to mentoring programs.

Books for Prisoners, sponsored by The North Heights Christian Church DWF group, Wichita, collects paperback books, and copies adult color sheets for inmates at the Butler County and Sedgwick County Jail. Reading is a mental health coping strategy for many prisoners and something they can do at night when they can't sleep.

Birthday Backpack Program, sponsored by Pine Valley Christian Church, Wichita, provides surprise backpacks filled with items a family needs to celebrate a child's birthday. They are given to economically at-risk children, providing a message that children are loved and remembered.


Peace Camp, sponsored by Topeka's West Side Christian Church, for the elementary age children of the church and children in the surrounding community. Peace Camp offers a fun setting to teach young children the skills that will help them communicate positively with a variety of people.

Our goal for this special offering is to receive \$25,000. This is then split with 50% of the funds going to the General Church for Denomination wide Reconciliation Ministry projects and the other 50% goes to fund our regional grant program to fund ministries like those listed above.

A MODERN PERSPECTIVE ON THE ANCIENT PRACTICE OF THE PRAYER LABYRINTH

Many Christians and churches are rediscovering an ancient prayer practice: a labyrinth. A labyrinth is a geometrically designed walking path leading to and from a central point. It is not a maze; you cannot get lost. There are no dead ends. The point is not disorientation, but orientation. Labyrinths have been used for centuries to facilitate prayer and meditation.

Prayer labyrinths are an ancient form of prayer that invite our bodies to participate in the process as we follow a path that mirrors the winding and circuitous journey of faith.

Your regional camp and conference center at Tawakoni offers a brick and gravel prayer labyrinth located just south of the chapel. Spend an afternoon in the quiet stillness of nature and recenter yourself.

If you plan to use the labyrinth outside a planned event, please call ahead (316-775-1222) and check-in with office staff or camp manager upon arrival.

BLESSING BOXES: A NEW TAKE ON AN OLD TRADITION

For 60 years, the women of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) have had a special way to express their gratitude to God for the blessings they have received – the Blessing Box.

Since 1953, Blessing Boxes have been kept in the homes and offices of women across the church to enable them to express their gratitude for everyday blessings by giving to others.

Now there is a new twist on this tradition that has everyone involved.

Outside Arkansas City Central Christian church sits a yellow box that sits upon a five-foot post.

Inside the box are nonperishable food items and toiletries. On the box a sign reads "Take what you need, leave what you can."

This type of blessing box serves as an example of how we can follow Jesus through serving our community. Residents who are in need can pick up items and those who want to give can drop off items 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The idea began from the concept of Free Little Libraries where library books can be taken or borrowed free of charge and other books put back in their place.

The Blessing Box has brought together several Arkansas City community organizations from Soroptimist Club and Rotary Club to a local Girl Scout troop and the church youth group. Anyone can help with the blessing box. All it takes is a caring heart.

THE COVENANT PROJECT: HOW WE DO CHURCH IN A NEW TIME AND PLACE



The future of the church is more connected. The future of the church is in deeper conversation. The future of the church is a future with deeper covenant. The Covenant Project is the work of changing structures to be more just and relationships across the church to be more connected.

The Covenant Project began more than three years ago as part of the work of Governance Committee of the General Board of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). When the Governance Committee met in retreat in the fall of 2019, they committed to the work of aligning The Design with God's design for the church and to claim the power and potential of covenant. To that end, the committee took two important steps: the first was the development of the Covenant Curriculum, a small group resource for congregations to explore their identity as covenantal partners in the wider church. The second was a process of a review of The Design, with an aim to explore how the church's structures and practices might shift to better serve the church, with two main areas of focus.

The first area of evaluation and recommendations is the General Assembly which refers to not just a gathering but the structure of how congregations relate to and engage with the larger church to provide feedback, prioritize vision and lead. The second area of evaluations and recommendations is centered around the General Board.

Why Now? Why This?

When the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) established The Design in 1969, much of the structures and practices were adapted from the existing structures. As our church has grown more expansive and diverse, we've made adaptations on the model. However, the changing composition of the church and a growing desire to have our structures reflect our commitment to be a movement for wholeness in a fragmented world means rethinking how we engage and relate to one another. Put simply, if we are going to be the church we say we are, we need to dismantle structures that aren't working well and reimagine how we relate to one another as the body of Christ. We want to be more connected, not less. We want congregations to be more connected to one another and the General Board, to have more of a voice in the present and future of the church. These changes will allow congregations to be able to provide feedback, set agendas and weigh in on the present and future of the church. They will allow the General Board and General Assembly to hear with more frequency and with more nuance from congregations so that more voices are heard and shape the church.

DISCIPLES INVITED TO PARTICIPATE IN GMP RE-ELECTION SURVEY



With great joy and anticipation, the General Board received Terri Hord Owens' desire to serve a second term as General Minister and President (GMP).

Over the past five years Terri has challenged the denomination to "imagine God's limitless love" as we

seek to be the church we say we are — "a movement for wholeness in a fragmented world." She has also challenged us to "imagine" what the church could be like in years to come. Following the General Board's acceptance of her intent, a Review/Search and Call Committee (RSCC) was formed to lead Terri's review.

We are asking for your assistance as we complete a review her work, ministerial and pastoral presence. The RSCC will provide information to the Administrative Committee of the General Board that will inform their recommendation for our 2023 General Assembly in Louisville, Ky.

Throughout the next few months, this committee will be gathering information from all expressions of the church. One method is through a survey open to every area of the church's life so the committee can have as broad an understanding of the desire of the church as possible.

Your answers to the survey are vital in offering a well-rounded view of the church's hopes and desires for the next six years. The committee encourages you to participate in the process by providing your feedback via the survey found at: **www.disciples.org/gmpsurvey**.

As our church begins this time of reflection, the RSCC invites you to join in a season of prayer, as together, we begin to discern the call of Rev. Hord Owens for a second term as GMP in the United States and Canada. We specifically ask that you pray for:

- Terri as she listens and reflects on God's call.
- The RSCC as we seek the wisdom and guidance from all expressions of our church and ecumenical partners.
- The Christian Church (DOC) as we are called to a movement for wholeness in a fragmented world.

DISCIPLES GENERAL BOARD NOMINATIONS SOUGHT

In service to the wider Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), the General Nominating Committee (GNC) holds the responsibility of recruiting faithful, dedicated, and diverse leaders for a number of roles critical to the work and witness of the denomination.

The GNC is currently seeking nominations for the General Board, which is the governing body that meets in between General Assemblies to oversee the business and support of the church.

The GNC is also paying close attention to the potential changes being explored by the <u>Covenant Project</u> and is looking for new leaders who will offer bold and visionary leadership for the church in a time of change.

WOC RESPONSE IN UKRAINE CONTINUES

Six months ago, on Feb. 24, the Russian invasion of Ukraine began. From the beginning, Week of Compassion, through ecumenical partnerships with ACT Alliance and other partner networks, has been and continues to respond both to immediate needs and long-term recovery plans.

The impact of the war is being felt around the world through the energy crisis and food insecurity brought on by the geopolitical situation. At the same time, other crises persist worldwide, and Week of Compassion continues to respond to needs in Afghanistan, eastern Africa, Syria, the Philippines, recent U.S. flooding, and more.

As millions have fled their homes for neighboring countries, and millions more are still displaced within their own nation, the work in and around Ukraine has been strong. Week of Compassion's partners have provided shelter, food, clothing, job support and training, legal and language assistance, psychosocial and spiritual support, and much more to hundreds of thousands of Ukrainians.

For example, Nadia spent several days with her daughter and her mother at a transition center run by the Evangelical Reformed Church in Switzerland. This gave her time to figure out where to go next, how to get there, and what to do.



Fighting tears, she said, "I am afraid of the situation. In Kyiv, I lived with my husband in a wonderful apartment, I had a car. Now, no one has a normal life. Everyone is on the run. I have no idea what my future will be and if I will ever be able to return. But the main thing is this: We are safe, away from the bombs."



Crisis response demands this attention to basics first - food, shelter, safety - especially in areas where fighting remains intense, but our ecumenical partners are experienced in adaptability, too.

Hungarian Interchurch Aid opened border welcome points in the early days for those driving and walking across the border, transitioned to supporting those

arriving by train shortly thereafter, and have now opened a centralized refugee hub in Budapest to offer wrap-around response serving ongoing needs.

Churches have been at the forefront of the response. Because they are part of the community, churches can respond quickly and then engage for the long haul, serving in a sustained way to meet emerging needs. Clergy also meet people's spiritual needs, offering prayer and support, and churches are significant contributors of volunteer and financial resources.

Plans are underway for addressing key issues: ensuring children's access to education while schools are being used as shelters, and providing safe, warm, dignified accommodation during the winter months close at hand. As the war carries on, the needs will not diminish in Ukraine, nor in other parts of the world. Week of Compassion, alongside ecumenical partners worldwide, will continue to support those displaced by the war as long as there is need.

Dighton, First Christian Church has called **Jennifer Bradford** as their new pastor. Jennifer began her ministry on Aug. 14 and was installed on Sept. 11.

Pine Valley Christian Church, Wichita has called **Rev. Dr. David P. Hansen** as their new pastor. David has served in ministry in the Disciples and UCC traditions for more than 40 years. Over the past several years, he has served twice as interim minister for Pine Valley CC.

IN MEMORIUM

Dee Winter, South Central Disciples
Women Cabinet Representative and SouthCentral District 5th Wednesday Women's
Treasurer, died Aug. 19. She was a member of
Central Christian of Arkansas City. Dee will be
remembered for her commitment to the
mission of Kansas Disciple Women (KDW), the
Winfield Christian Church, Arkansas City Central
Christian Church, 5th Wednesday group of SC
District, Women's Retreats and Spirit Fest each.

Rev. William (Bill) Bowles, 90, died July 30. Bill attended 12 years of higher education at Manhattan Bible College, Phillips University, and Vanderbilt University. He was ordained into Christian ministry in 1952, and pastored ten churches in five states: Kansas, Oklahoma, Kentucky, Iowa, and Colorado.

John Gould, husband of Christian Church Foundation Vice President, Kirby Gould died on Monday, Aug. 15, in Olathe. At Hillcrest Christian Church, Olathe, John served as elder, trustee, and chair of the property committee. His most satisfying call to service was being nominated to serve on the General Board of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) from 1996-1999.

Claudia Ewing Grant, former Deputy
General Minister of the Christian Church
(Disciples of Christ) died Aug. 10. After serving as
pastor to churches in Arkansas and Indiana, she
was called to serve in 1987 as Deputy General
Minister. Claudia was the highest-ranking
woman to ever serve in the church at that time,
a position with national and global reach.
