
As we remember these blessings, I pray we will be motivated to become a blessing to our neighbors so that all who are in need will have those needs met.

TOPEKA FCC FOOD HANDOUT

First Christian Church Topeka feeds hungry people! They have partnered with the Harvester's organization to be a food distribution site.

Once a month, tons of food are dropped off in the church's parking lot. After a bit of sorting and repackaging, hundreds of people and families drive through and receive food.

"It is a beautiful program that touches many lives. But more than that, it connects three churches!" said Co-Regional Minister and church member, Tom Stanley.

Because the food is dropped in FCC's parking lot, the guests park in the Baptist Church parking lot across the street.

Additionally, FCC partners with Trinity Presbyterian Church who is also a food dropoff point, volunteers from both churches help pass out food to awaiting vehicles.

FCC also prepares 150 sack lunches every Sunday for The Hope Center. The Hope Center only serves one meal to those in need on Sunday. FCC stepped into this gap and provides food for hungry people in need.

"This is what it means to be a Disciple of Christ!" said Stanley. "We are strengthening the whole Body of Christ while caring for those in need."

MY 'JESUS NAILS' OPENING THE DOOR TO EVANGELISM THROUGH EVERYDAY CONVERSATION



Several years ago, I owned an ornamental iron and sculpture company. We created lots of unusual things. (see the giant bugs in the Downing Children's Garden at Botanica, Wichita)

We painted most of the pieces we created with specialty finishes and very concentrated enamel paint.

Many times, I would get the paint on my hands and found that, even though it washed off my skin easily, sometimes it really stuck to my fingernails.

One day, in a grocery store, I realized that the paint on my nails made people a little uncomfortable. I thought to myself, "Hmm. This could be fun..." Over the years I've had lots of fun making people wonder. Today, I call them my "Jesus nails" and here's why:

When was the last time you talked to someone you didn't know about Jesus?

Opening a conversation about our Savior can be a pretty hard thing to do. We don't want to offend. We don't want people to think "Oh, here we go with the "Jesus" thing again." Talking about Christ can really put us on-the-spot and may even cause us to have to follow up with that person.

GETTING YOUR CHURCH READY FOR WINTER

Here's a guide to maintaining the inside and outside of your building during the winter.

- Heating System: Your system should be inspected and serviced by a licensed contractor.
 Check furnace filters and replace them every three months. Keep combustible material at least 36 inches from heating units.
- Frozen Pipes: Know the location of the main water shut off valve. Wrap
 exposed water pipes with pipe insulation. Close windows near water pipes
 and cover open-air vents. Drain and disconnect faucets from hoses.
 Irrigation systems should be winterized by specialists With extreme
 temperatures, turn interior faucets to a slow drip to reduce pipe freezing.
- Roof and Gutters: Examine roofs to search for cracking, blistering, cupping, peeling, or loss of granulation. Check drains, gutters, and valleys for debris blocking roof drainage. Check downspouts to ensure runoff goes away from the building. Prune trees close to your building.
- **Ice Dam Prevention**: Ensure the attic has sufficient insulation and ventilation. Seal any openings in the attic, like heat ducts, light fixtures, and vent pipes. Use a snow rake to clear snow 2-3 feet from all roof edges.
- Parking Lots and Walkways: Fill cracks and reseal the surface of your asphalt lot. This should be done every 3-5 years. Excessive ice melt can damage concrete. Use ice melt per the manufacturer's instructions.

JESUS AND ANXIETY

The DSM V diagnostic criteria for generalized anxiety disorder is, "The presence of excessive anxiety or worry about a variety of events or activities for at least six months." Anxiety is an overwhelming uneasiness, full of emotional turmoil.

Explaining the life of Jesus of Nazareth, the author of Hebrews 2:15 in the *Message Bible* says this anxiety can literally scare us to death. Cowering through life, living hunched over and worried, is an accurate description of anxiety..."scared to death of death." Hebrews 2:16-18 talks about the anxiety and inward pain we all have. Jesus didn't go to all this trouble for angels. It was for people like us, children of Abraham. DCHS President Announces Retirement

Disciples of Christ Historical Society announces the retirement next year of DCHS President, the Rev. Dr. Richard H. (Rick) Lowery.

During Dr. Lowery's tenure, DCHS has expanded its efforts toward digitizing and making its extensive resources accessible online to a global audience. It has launched the online-only *Journal of Discipliana*, a



peer-reviewed journal for original scholarship on topics related to the theology, history, and practice of churches in the Disciples and broader Stone-Campbell tradition.

Under his leadership, DCHS has focused on telling stories of historically underrepresented groups in the Disciples/Stone-Campbell tradition and recruiting authors for biographies of significant Disciples leaders such as Preston Taylor and Sarah Lue Bostick.

"Dr. Lowery has brought the Disciples of Christ Historical Society into the modern age. With his deep knowledge and love of Stone-Campbell history and his ability to convey the importance of our history, he has drawn new enthusiasts into the fold," stated Archie Jenkins, Chairman of the DCHS Board of Trustees. "We are grateful for the energy and experience Rick has brought to DCHS and will miss him greatly. We wish him and his family the best as they step into this new journey."

BRITE DIVINITY SCHOOL PRESIDENT ANNOUNCES RETIREMENT

At a recent Board of Trustees meeting, Brite Divinity School President Newell Williams announced his intended retirement.



Dr. Williams has served in the capacity since May of 2003, having previously taught at Christian Theological Seminary in Indianapolis and at Brite on the TCU Campus.

Since coming to Brite as President, Dr. Williams has overseen the expansion of the faculty, the growth of the Ph.D. program, the construction of a new classroom and administrative facility, and a continuation and expansion of Brite's longstanding determination to pursue the vision of a world transformed by God's love, mercy, and justice.

An internationally respected church historian, author of numerous books, Dr. Williams is also an ordained minister within the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). In receiving this announcement, the Board of Trustees voted unanimously to confer upon Dr. Williams the title of President Emeritus.

The Brite Board of Trustees will immediately form a Transition Committee charged with ensuring a smooth transition, beginning with the appointment of an Interim President who will lead as a bridge to the next era of Brite Divinity School. Dr. William's retirement from his position was effective Aug. 31.
