## 2023 CAMP SCHEDULE IS HERE!

We are experimenting with a new online registration platform: RegFox. Our hope is that its simple strait forward design will make it easy for parents to sign up their kids while providing camp directors with all the necessary information for a fun and safe camp experience.

Beginning in March, churches that pay all or part of the registration fee will receive a weekly report of campers who have

signed up to attend camp from their church along with payment instructions.

Previously this year, we explored a three tiered pricing structure. We have decided to rethink that idea for another year. The new fee structure is closer to what we have had in previous years. We apologize for the confusion and we hope you will bear with us as we explore this option in the future. Churches that pay all or part of the registration fee are encouraged to use the Full Price/True Cost amount to ensure an efficient and sustainable camp program for generations to come.

## THOUGHTS FROM YOUR REGIONAL MINISTER

To all companions of The Way, who make up the communities of faith within the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in Kansas, I send you greetings in the name of the one who is our guide, our strength, our healer and our sustainer.

I am grateful for the ministry, the witness, and the lives

you are living to make visible the Kindom of Heaven here on earth as it already exists in heaven. For this is the work that we have been called to do when we were called to follow in the footsteps of Jesus. I am honored that I get to walk beside you and provide what encouragement and counsel God has given me to share. This has been my great joy for these past fifteen years and, God willing, my joy for years to come.

As you already know we live in peculiar and precarious times. There are forces we deal with daily that threaten our witness and our way of life of loving others as God has already loved us (John 13:34-35). Space does not permit me to name all these forces or explore them in depth, but I will name two.

One force we contend with fans the flames of our sense of righteousness and justice. If these flames reach an excess, we can be led to champion only the letter of the law and forget about the spirit of compassion for all that must accompany this work if we are to reflect the love of God. This force is the spirit of Pharisaism that Jesus contended with regularly.

Another force we contend with blinds us to the covenantal and communal nature of our life. This force tries to convince us that our Christian faith is only about our personal relationship with God, and we do not need to relate to each other, or that the congregations we associate with do not need to be connected to a wider community of faith. When we are captured by this force, we can easily be led astray so that we end up committing great acts of evil in the name of God. It is only in being in relationship with others, both individually and communally, that we come to know and live out what it means to love others as God has loved us.

It is my prayer that compassion and covenantal community will be marks of who we are as people of The Way of Jesus.

## ECM AT K-STATE OFFERS ECO-THEOLOGY IN ACTION

How can Kansas Disciples authentically engage God's call in the lives of university students? At Ecumenical Campus Ministries (ECM), this looks like caring about the environment.



ECM provides a rigorous hands-

on opportunity, every semester, to connect student's convictions at the ECM Sustainability Retreat. The retreat happens twice per year and supports environmental curiosity and exploration at various locations including an organic farm in Independence, urban farms in Kansas City, and other locations across Manhattan.

This retreat, generally over a weekend, has an accompanied wholistic curriculum written by ECM leadership during the pandemic. The curriculum focuses on a two-year cycle—with 4 units of progression written by ministers, teachers, scientists, and therapists. It is an unique combination of faith-based and science-based approaches.

Eventually, ECM hopes to offer course credit through the university for our program so students can apply their love for God's creation in their academic degree programs. This retreat is BELOVED by those who participate, and it is continually evolving.

### KANSAS CHURCH MISSION FEATURE:

Wichita, North Heights Christian Church

North Heights Christian Church, Wichita is described by pastor Rev. Luis Mendez as a family oriented, small church with a big heart of love and welcome, that makes it a point for the congregation to greet and welcome visitors.

No doubt that is a true and accurate description, but the way they work in the community to meet, serve, equip and connect is a tribute to putting in the work. North Heights is a diverse church with a primarily African American congregation, and they have trained members through two book studies to learn what it takes to be welcoming and inclusive.

Those studies have culminated in community action. NHCC members participate in an outreach ministry project each



month. The objective for the ministry is to reach people beyond the walls of NHCC. In January members prepared "Bags of Blessings", which included hygiene items to be distributed to those in need in Wichita. This year plans are to enlarge their community garden



which will provide a needed source of fresh produce to Wichita residents. And the church also encourages interaction with the local Union Rescue Mission, where on some Sundays, men from the Union Rescue Mission come to worship at NHCC.

To connect and equip within the region, NHCC's 2022 Women's Day Congregation event reached out to other DoC women across the region and resulted in networking with women from two different DoC churches in Kansas.

Do the training, do the work, and get the results are the formula as NHCC applies the knowledge from their studies, the Word, and discussions about how God is working in their lives and how the Word applies to their lives.

**Counselors**: Adults who have a passion for working with children and youth. They are with the campers throughout the camp experience.

**Nurses**: The nurses give medications, monitor the health of campers, and at times drive campers to the Emergency Room when required. for 3-4 college age students with a heart for God and children.

- $\Rightarrow$  15-30 days prior to event = 50% refund
- $\Rightarrow$  7-14 days prior = 25% refund
- $\Rightarrow$  6 days prior or no-show at event = no refund.

### TRAINING SESSION TO MINISTER TO ADOPTIVE, FOSTER AND KINSHIP FAMILIES

Mark your calendars and save the date for a special training event entitled, "Children from Trauma: Churches Ministering to Adoptive/Foster and Kinship Families" held Sept. 14 from 7-9 p.m. via Zoom.

The workshop is hosted by Greg Rea, an ordained Disciples minister, a Trust-based Relational Intervention Practitioner and Post-Adoptive Support Specialist who has provided hundreds of hours of training/coaching to over a thousand families and professionals.

There are more than 6,000 children in "out of home" care in the state of Kansas. These children and families often struggle with their children's and teens' challenging behaviors caused by previous abuse, neglect or trauma. Evidence suggests that every Christian Church in Kansas is connected to families that are raising children from trauma.

For example, at the CYF camp in 2022, 25% of the campers were living with caregivers that were not their biological parents. This training will provide principals and strategies to equip parents and church ministries to care for children in a way that promotes healing in the hearts and minds of children and teens.

### CCK to Offer Four Boundaries Training Sessions in 2023 for Clergy, Lay Leaders

the congregation.

## THE GIFT OF COMPASSION KCH'S RAMSEY EMERGENCY FUND

One day, an employee called off from her shift because she lived outside of town and had a flat tire. Several days went by, with her calling each day explaining she had no funds to get the tire fixed and no way to get to work. After about a week, she was terminated.

Fortunately, the employees at Kanas Christian Home (KCH) will never face this kind of crisis because of the compassion of Neewannah Ramsey and supporters such as yourself. In Sept. 2011, Ramsey gifted funds to KCH to start an emergency fund for the employees. The Ramsey Fund provides interest-free loans to employees experiencing an unforeseen crisis. In 2022, 14 staff members were assisted in their time of crisis. This includes car repairs, legal assistance, medical expenses, housing and utilities.

## TIME FOR A TECHNOLOGY UPGRADE? DCEF CAN HELP.

Disciples Church Extension Fund (DCEF) is offering up to US \$50,000 for congregations looking to improve their technology, whether it is tangible equipment purchases or upgrades.
