"SUSTAINING OUR MOVEMENT FOR WHOLENESS: RECLAIMING OUR IDENTITY AS DISCIPLES OF CHRIST "



The 2023 Disciples Connect and Equip Regional Gathering will be Saturday, Aug. 12, at McPherson First Christian Church. The day begins at 8:30 a.m. with registration check-in and fellowship time followed by an opening gathering at 9:30 a.m. Lunch will be a make-your-own hamburger bar, with potato salad, baked beans, desserts, and a drink. The day concludes with closing worship at 2:30 p.m. and a benediction at 3:30 p.m.

Our theme is "Sustaining our Movement for Wholeness:

Reclaiming our Identity as Disciples of Christ." We will focus on what it means to be a movement for wholeness in terms of physical, spiritual, congregational/organizational wholeness and wellbeing.

Inspirational 2022 workshop leader, Rev. Josh Leu will keynote this year's event. During his 9-year tenure as senior pastor at Great Bend First Christian Church, the congregation has doubled its average worship attendance divided among four services, making it one of the fastest growing Disciple congregations in the Kansas region. Josh's leadership initiative to add a modern worship service, while keeping their formal traditional worship service, allows them to minister to every generation.



Josh is married to Ashley, and they have two amazing girls Karys and Khora.



Kansas Leadership Center's Ed O'Malley and Julia Fabris McBride will lead the day's morning workshops. They will present the "nuts and bolts" of KLC's Leadership Principles and their biblical basis and their application to church life.

Tentative workshop topics include The Church Narrative Project Storytelling Moment, The Covenant Project, and The Benefits of KCL Leadership Training.

Children and youth activities for those 5-18 years are

planned. Children and youth are encouraged to come reconnect with their camp friends. Child care will be provided for children under 5 years.

The registration fee is \$25 per adult, \$10 per youth (5-18 years), and children under 5 years are free. Disciples Connect and Equip event t-shirts are \$15. Other CCK merchandise will be available for sale at the event. Exhibitor space is available for CCK and DOC ministries. Cost is \$50 per 3-foot table space or \$100 per 6-foot space. Wifi and electrical available upon request.

SOCIAL MEDIA AS A DIGITAL MINISTRY

Every year, there is an increasing number of people signing up for and using social media. Did you know that 35 percent of the couples married between 2005 and 2012 met online? Back in 2010 less than a billion people were active on social media. By 2019, there were around 2.8 billion people using social media.

People are building important networks and connections online, and it is becoming a valuable way

for people to connect. There's no longer any question of if your church should be on social media. You need to prioritize using it well. In fact, it might be a secret weapon for struggling churches.

Michael Persaud of Church Brand Guide, proposes this idea of "digital missionaries" or people who serve, add value and point attention to Jesus through platforms like social media. Persaud wrote, "By embracing this perspective, individuals and organizations can approach social media with a genuine desire to impact lives and spread the love of Christ."

Social media is a helpful tool that church leaders need to understand and use in their local churches. Churches and leaders that remain absent from social media are not able to use this tool to expand the Kingdom.

One of the great things social media does is it enables all types of leaders, not just pastors, to broaden their influence and impact. Effective social media campaigns require the collaborative work of many. For this, you need a team.

"These individuals can bring a diverse range of skills, perspectives, and talents to the table, making the ministry more dynamic and impactful," said Persaud. "By involving volunteers, churches and ministries can foster a sense of ownership, engagement, and discipleship among their team members."

A key component of social media is that it's meant to be social. Encourage current members to interact with your posts and share your content to their personal pages. Doing so can also expand your reach into demographic circles that you would not have a connection to otherwise.

Persaud adds that in terms of social media content "one fundamental principle for effective social media ministry is to add value before asking for anything in return. Instead of bombarding followers with promotional content or constant requests, providing valuable and meaningful content that educates, inspires and engages the audience is essential."

He explains that by providing content that adds value to your social media audience's live, you build trust and by building trust the people you reach are more receptive to the message and ministry you share. You need to have a variety yet predictable pattern of timely and relatable content to engage your audience.

Here are a few ideas:

- Create a contest
- Go "behind the scenes" on an event or ministry
- Interview your pastor or church staff member
- Quote your pastor
- Share a reading list or book of the month
- Spotlight a volunteer

EVERY CENT COUNTS WHEN YOU HONOR GOD

"It is all about your heart ... Everything we have is a gift from God and in return, we should respond with gratitude."

Most Americans don't consider themselves rich. But if you live in the United States, you are among the wealthiest people in the world. We've been blessed with money and resources, and we are responsible for what God has given us.

God commands us to bring ten percent of our income back to the church in the tithe. But what about the rest of our income? Just because God gives us the freedom of spend 90 percent of His money doesn't mean there are no consequences for how it's used. God cares about the 90 percent because He cares about you.

God wants us to enjoy our money. But He doesn't want us to put our hope in it or be enslaved to it. Either way, money is a bad master who leaves us wanting. By honoring God with everything, not just the tithe, we protect ourselves from the temptation of making money our god.

For some of us, honoring God with everything means giving more generously. What we don't have can't own us. For some of us, the next step is learning to save. Saving breaks the debt cycle so we can start asking "What does God want me to do?" instead of "What do I have to do?"

Wealth is one of many ways Jesus blesses us with more than we deserve. There's nothing wrong with taking pleasure in the abundance God gives us, as long as we don't start worshiping the gift instead of the Giver.

Think about:

- Do you see yourself as rich? Why or why not?
- Are you using your other 90 percent responsibly? In what way do you need to change how you are stewarding your finances to be more faithful to Jesus?
- Do you need help creating a plan for the remaining 90 percent?

KANSAS CHURCH MISSION FEATURE:

Wichita, Woodridge Christian Church



Woodridge Christian Church is a medium sized congregation located on the far east side of Wichita. A few years ago, they identified themselves, through study, as a group with a common spiritual gift of "Being Helpers".

Based on this foundational knowledge they set out to implement and initiate a comprehensive mission program with a common goal to, "Reach out. Lift up. Teach Love".

By design their mission program is set-up to connect and equip based on a model of the 3-legged stool.

One leg is for local mission where WCC members reach out in the community with service programs working with The Ronald McDonald House to provide meals for long-stay hospital families. Organizing and playing BINGO with the veterans at the Bob Dole Regional VA Medical Center, or most recently providing a fund-raiser for Sunlight Child Advocacy in support of abused or neglected children.

The WCC youth reach out through service programs like Random Acts of Kindness, delivering Valentines and Christmas poinsettias to local nursing homes and making sleeping mats for the homeless. A second leg involves a regional or national scope where WCC volunteers give their time for service projects where there is need. Whether it's hurricane relief in New Orleans or Houston, service projects in Detroit or providing aid where needed in Colorado or Oklahoma, WCC members will travel to connect.

International service is the third leg, which involves WCC's commitment to La Flor, a small village in the mountains of

Nicaragua. With help from Just Hope, a service organization headquartered in Tulsa, members have travelled to La Flor to help build homes and latrines. From Wichita the congregation has provided the community with regular monetary support for a microbank program, health services



and children's education.

WCC's mission program is a faithful execution of their three-part goal, and they are connecting and equipping around the world.

Campers love to receive mail from friends and family back home. Include the camp session (i.e., Junior, Grand Camp, CYF, etc.) along with your camper's name. To ensure timely delivery, letters need to be addressed in the following format.

Remember, there is no mail delivery on the last day of camp, and it often takes two to three days to arrive. Consider sending letters early to ensure your letter's arrival. Letters that arrive before a camp session starts will be held in the office for camper's arrival. Letters arriving after a camp session end will be returned to the camper's home church.

Another option is to email your messages to the camp office, *scd@kansasdisciples.org*, and a staff member will deliver your message with the day's mail. Include the camper's name and camp session in the subject line.

Packages are highly discouraged as it takes longer to process and deliver. Please do not send food as it is not permitted in the bunk rooms.


